#### **Methodology - Current Wave**

• This research has been conducted over multiple waves. The funding for this wave was provided by the Swedish International Development and Cooperation Agency (Sida)

#### Current survey wave:

- Fieldwork dates: June 4 June 22, 2012
- 6,299 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample including urban and rural areas as well as additional representative samples of the self governing cities of Tbilisi, Kutaisi, Batumi, Poti and Rustavi as well as the Majoritarian districts of Saburtalo, Isani, Samgori, Nadzaladvi, Gldani, Telavi, Kobuleti, Zugdidi and Gori

#### Sample design

- NDI and CRRC use a complex survey design with both stratification and clustering. There are sixteen macro-strata: Saburtalo, Isani, Samgori, Nadzaladevi, Gldani, Other Capital, Rustavi, Kutaisi, Batumi, Poti, Gori district, Telavi district, Zugdidi district, Kobuleti district, Other Urban, Other Rural. This included 609 clusters of electoral precincts.
- Households are selected via random route sampling
- Respondents are selected using a Kish table
- Randomly selected households and individuals are not substituted
- All interviews are conducted face-to-face
- The average margin of error does not exceed +/- 2%

#### **Methodology – Historical Waves**

- This research has been conducted over multiple waves. The funding for most waves was provided by Sida, however one wave was funded by the Eurasia Foundation and one by the British Embassy
- Historical waves:

#### February 2012

- Fieldwork dates: February 22 March 5, 2012
- 3,161 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample including representative samples of Tbilisi, Kutaisi, Batumi, Poti, Rustavi, Telavi District 17, other urban and rural areas

#### September 2011

- Fieldwork dates: September 9-21, 2011
- 2,425 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample with additional representative samples in Tbilisi, Kutaisi, Batumi, Poti, Rustavi, Telavi District 17, other urban and rural areas

#### March 2011


- Fieldwork dates: March 4-17, 2011
- 2,893 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample, including representative samples in Tbilisi, Kutaisi, Batumi, Rustavi, other urban and rural areas

#### April 2010

- Fieldwork dates: April 11-26, 2010
- 2,053 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample, including an oversample of Tbilisi and representative samples in urban and rural areas
- The average margin of error for these waves is +/- 3%








### How do you think the situation has changed in Georgia compared to January 2008? (q2)








### How do you think the situation has changed in Georgia compared to January 2008? (q5, National)


#### Do you consider yourself to be employed? (q106)


#### Do you consider yourself to be employed? (q106 X Gender)






#### Do you consider yourself to be employed? (q106 X Age)

### Georgian Employment at a Glance


The illustration to the right shows these groups as follows:

- 29%--Non-active labour force (This includes students, homemakers, retired persons who are not interested in looking for a job, etc.)




### Generally, taking everything into account, since January 2008 are you and your household comparative condition . . . (q10)





#### In which direction is Georgia going? (q11)











#### What does democracy mean to you? (q17)






### To what extent do you agree or disagree that the current government is making the changes that matter to you? (q13)



To what extent do you agree or disagree that your current local government is making the changes that matter to you? (q14)




# Which three reforms do you think would be most important for Georgia/which do you expect to see achieved during the next 6 months? (q7/8)




A special commission called the Voters List Verification Commission was established to verify the accuracy of voters' list relying mostly on door to door outreach of households. Were you aware of this commission?




# Do you expect the work of the VLC to improve the voter's list? - of 78% (q35)




#### Have you been visited by VLC at home? - of 78 % (q36)




# How would you assess their work? - out of those who have been visited (q37)






# How do you think the coming parliamentary elections will be conducted? (q27)



### What do you think are the three biggest barriers to free and fair elections in Georgia? (q28)




### Whose opinion do you think matters most, when it comes to deciding whether elections have been run well? (q29)












Do you personally know someone who you believe was fired from a state/public job because of their political beliefs? (q94)
















#### When deciding who you want as your Majoritarian MP, what is important for you? (name up to three) (q49)




#### Comparing the performance of men and women in elected office, what do you think? (q50)




#### Comparing the performance of men and women in elected office, what do you think? (q50 X Gender)




## Would you vote for a woman candidate in the next parliamentary elections? (q51)






#### Do you think 9 women members in parliament is...? (q52)






#### Where do you get information about the activities of your Majoritarian MP? (up to three) (q77)






# Do you approve or disapprove of Georgia's current relationship with Russia? (q60)






# If 2012 parliamentary elections were held tomorrow, would you vote? (q20)



# If 2012 parliamentary elections were held tomorrow, would you vote? (q20 X Gender)




# If presidential elections were held tomorrow, would you vote? (q23)




#### What are your main sources of information for receiving news about Georgian politics and current events? (q63 - q64)




### Do you watch coverage of Georgian politics and current events on the following channels? (q66) National




### Do you watch coverage of Georgian politics and current events on the following channels? (q66) Regional




#### Do you think that news about Georgian politics and current affairs on the following Georgian TV channels mostly reflect the interests of government, opposition or neither? (q67) National




# Do you think that news about Georgian politics and current affairs on the following Georgian TV channels mostly reflect the interests of government, opposition or neither? (q67) Regional



#### In general, how much do you trust coverage of news and current affairs on the following TV channels? (q68) National






