Methodology - Current Wave

 This research has been conducted over multiple waves. The funding for this wave was provided by the Swedish International Development and Cooperation Agency (Sida)

Current survey wave:

- Fieldwork dates: August 18 September 3, 2013
- 3,838 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample of Georgian speakers including Capital, Urban, Rural, East Georgia and West Georgia areas. Also additional representative samples of the self governing cities of Kutaisi, Batumi, Poti and Rustavi, as well as the districts of Telavi, Gori, Akhaltsikhe, Zugdidi and Ambrolauri.

Sample design

- NDI and CRRC use a complex survey design with both stratification and clustering
- Households are selected via random route sampling
- Respondents are selected using a Kish table
- Randomly selected households and individuals are not substituted
- All interviews are conducted face-to-face
- The average margin of error is +/- 2%

Methodology – Historical Waves

- This research has been conducted over multiple waves. The funding for most waves was provided by Sida, however one wave was funded by the Eurasia Foundation and one by the British Embassy
- Historical waves:

June 2013:

- Fieldwork dates: June 12 26, 2013
- 2,338 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample of Georgian speakers including Capital, Urban, Rural, East Georgia and West Georgia areas.
- The average margin of error does not exceed +/-2.9%


March 2013:


- Fieldwork dates: March 13 27, 2013
- 3,103 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample of Georgian speakers including Capital, Urban, Rural, East Georgia and West Georgia areas.
- The average margin of error does not exceed +/- 2.5%


November 2012


- Fieldwork dates: November 14 25, 2012
- 1,947 completed interviews
- A nationally representative sample including capital, urban, rural, East Georgia and West Georgia areas
- The average margin of error does not exceed +/- 3%






















How would you rate the performance of ...? (q61) Part 1




How would you rate the performance of ...? (q61) Part 2




How would you rate the performance of the following ministers? (q61) Part 1











How would you assess Prime Minister Ivanishvili's performance in ...? (q62) Part 1






How important is it, if at all, that there is a strong opposition party in the country? (q18)






Is Georgia a democracy now? (q16 X Future Presidential vote - Likely voters)




To what extent do you agree or disagree that the current government is making the changes that matter to you? (q13 X Future Presidential vote - Likely voters)




After the parliamentary elections of October 2012 has the number of jobs available in Georgia ... (q11 X Future Presidential vote - Likely voters)



After the parliamentary elections of October 2012 has the level of crime in Georgia ... (q12 X Future Presidential vote - Likely voters)




Which of the following two statements do you agree with? (q68 X Future Presidential vote - Likely voters)






Which party is closest to you? (q63)




If presidential elections were held tomorrow, would you vote? (q66)



If presidential elections were held tomorrow, would you vote? (q66 X Settlement)




Which of the following people would you most like to see as the next president of Georgia? (q67) Likely voters only
